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45 NURSING HOMES ACROSS NEW YORK STATE SANCTIONED FOR POOR CARE

FROM BROOKLYN TO ROCHESTER TO SYRACUSE, HOMES ACROSS NY FOUND TO BE FAILING VULNERABLE RESIDENTS

New York, April 30, 2010: Fifteen (15) New York State nursing homes have been fined by the state and 20 have received federal fines, according to a report released today by the Long Term Care Community Coalition (LTCCC). LTCCC reports to the public all enforcement actions taken against nursing homes by the state and federal governments every three months in its newsletter and on its website, www.nursinghome411.org. Today's report is of actions taken from September – December 2009.

In addition to the nursing homes that were fined, the state took other actions against 18 facilities. All of these actions are the result of these nursing homes failing to meet minimum standards. Some of the facilities were found to have put their residents in "immediate jeopardy" or of providing "substandard quality of care" – the two most serious categorizations of harm to residents.

LTCCC is also reporting selected actions taken during this time period by the NYS Attorney General's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (MFCU). The unit prosecutes cases of resident abuse in nursing homes. The three cases reported on today involve falsifying records to indicate that patient care was given when it was not, physical abuse of a resident and photographing a resident's genitals with a cell phone and transmitting the picture.
