



MARCH 10 CMS GUIDANCE: INITIAL THOUGHTS

Positive Change #1

An outbreak or a county positivity rate over 10% will NOT bar all residents from having visitors

- Visitation will be limited only for:
 - Unvaccinated residents, if the nursing home's COVID-19 county positivity rate is >10% and <70% of residents in the facility are fully vaccinated
 - Residents with confirmed COVID-19 infection
 - Residents in quarantine

Positive Change #2

A confirmed case of COVID within the past 14 days will NOT shut down visitation for all residents

 If a case of COVID is confirmed in a particular unit or area and the first round of outbreak testing finds no other cases on any other units – visitation will be shut down for that unit only

Other positives



In general, visitation is not tied to vaccination for residents

Visitors are not required to be vaccinated or tested

Personal touch is permitted

- Residents who are fully vaccinated can choose to have close contact
 - Must wear a well-fitting face mask and perform hand hygiene before and after






Concern #1

- No establishment of an Essential Support Person
- Allows facilities to take actions that would prevent visits for providing care/support


Concern # 2

- Shoulds!!
